Using LPM to Strengthen the In-House/Outside Counsel Relationship: From Scoping to Project Completion | September 3 | 10:00 – 10:50 am PDT

Moving beyond AI-Powered Agreement Review to AI Document Interrogation: How Energizer Saved Hundreds of Hours with a combination of LPM protocols and AI technology. This program will share a case study of Legal Project Management protocols and disciplines applied to an AI-centric legal project. Energizer faced a significant challenge: a large volume of agreements needed to be analyzed to address almost 30 unique legal questions and concepts posed by business stakeholders. The in-house legal team estimated that completing the project manually would require hundreds of hours of work, creating a resource and time burden that was difficult to manage efficiently. This session will explore how Energizer partnered with Husch Blackwell's AI, Data Science, and Legal Operations teams to leverage innovative AI and machine learning (ML) tools and LPM to tackle a high-volume agreement review project. Attendees will learn about the collaborative process, the project's unique flat-fee structure, and how a tiered human review element was incorporated to ensure accuracy. The session will also highlight how this approach dramatically reduced costs and saved Energizer hundreds of hours compared to traditional document review methods.

Information Architecture: The Foundation for AI-Enabled Transformation in Legal Departments | September 3 | 1:30 – 2:20 pm PDT

Information architecture is fundamental to enabling AI in the legal field, ensuring that data is structured, standardized, and accessible for automation and advanced analytics. Structured legal datasets—such as precedent databases, phase and task code sets, and key data points from sales and purchaser agreements—allow AI to streamline workflows, enhance decision—making, and improve efficiency. By organizing legal data in a structured format, firms can leverage AI for contract analysis, due diligence, and predictive modelling. Standardized datasets also enable interoperability across legal tech platforms, ensuring consistency in billing, case management, and knowledge retrieval.

In the context of generative AI (GenAI), a well-architected legal dataset is crucial for training models to generate reliable legal insights, draft contracts, and summarize complex legal documents. By structuring data effectively, GenAI can recognize patterns, infer legal reasoning, and assist with automating legal research, ultimately transforming legal operations and enhancing accessibility to legal expertise at scale.
